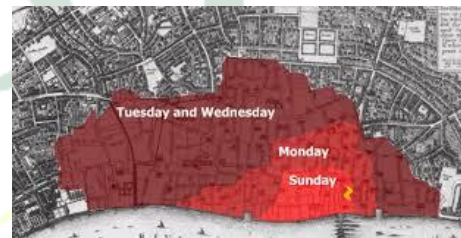

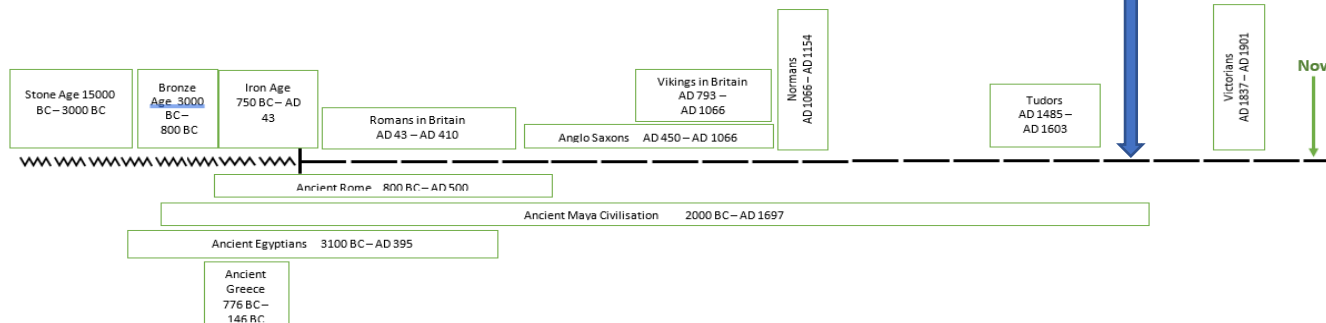
History

The Great Fire of London

- Sunday 2nd September 1666 – Thursday 6th September 1666
- Started in a bakery on Pudding Lane.
- A spark fell out of the oven at night.
- Buildings were made from wood and straw and were very close together. The fire spread quickly.
- No firefighters or fire brigade. Soldiers pulled down houses with fire hooks and used leather buckets and water squirts to try to put out the fire.
- Strong winds blew the fire quickly.
- The Navy started to blow up houses with gunpowder.
- 13,200 houses and 87 churches were destroyed including St Paul's Cathedral.
- Only 6 official deaths were recorded.
- Samuel Pepys kept a diary of the events.

The Pantiles

- Chalybeate Spring discovered in 1606 by Dudley Lord North
- Pantiles (formally known as The Walks) built around this by Lord Abergavenny.
- Royalty and rich people visited to drink from the spring for their health.

Activist and Campaigner

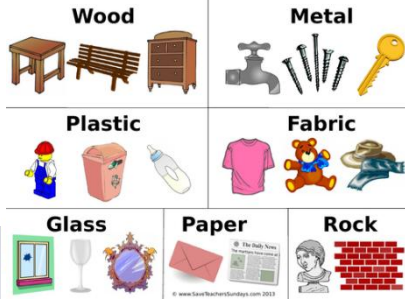
- One of the first Woman Councillors for Tunbridge Wells 1919 -1930
 - Women's rights and votes for women
 - Female police officers
 - Better housing for poor people
 - Better work for poor people
- World War I



- Helped refugees from Belgium – award from King of Belgium
 - Helped clean and repair soldiers' uniforms.
- Retirement
- Helped turn a workhouse into a hospital at Pembury.

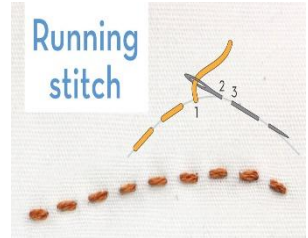
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Textiles – Super Hero cape for a Teddy Bear

Symbol: a picture or image used to represent an object or place.

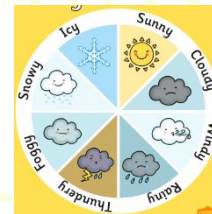
Directions: Instructions to show where to go – forward, backward, up, down, near, far
